2024 saw Surrey Libraries welcome our first Indigenous Knowledge Keeper, Les George. Les helped bring Indigenous programming to Surrey Libraries and fostered a deeper understanding of Indigenous cultures among our staff and patrons.

Another key initiative undertaken included relaunching the StreetSMART program in partnership with the City of Surrey and Lookout Housing and Health Society. This program supports the unsheltered population in multiple ways including obtaining IDs, rental subsidies, income assistance, referrals to shelters and supportive housing applications, substance use and mental health services, transportation for appointments, and advocacy to assist people with multiple barriers.

The Library also made a concerted effort to increase communications and engagement with patrons through a variety of emails such as welcome messages, birthday messages, survey invitations, and information about special events and programs. Through these additional communications we aim to help patrons learn about the value of their library membership and to make the most of the services available.

We want to extend our thanks to the City of Surrey and the Province of British Columbia for recognizing the value of libraries in our communities. Thank you also to the many volunteers, donors, community partners, and patrons who support our libraries. Finally, we extend a heart-felt thanks to the Board and staff of Surrey Libraries for their ongoing dedication, enthusiasm and commitment to building a better community.

In 2024, we witnessed an unprecedented milestone as a record 33,301 individuals registered for library cards—a testament to the deepening connection and enthusiasm our residents have for library services. This past year also marked a significant 19% surge in the circulation of physical materials, with 3,561,691 items borrowed. Furthermore, the demand for eBooks and eAudiobooks soared, reflecting a 17% increase, with more than 1.4 million titles enjoyed by our patrons.

These impressive achievements underscore the vital role Surrey Libraries plays in fostering literacy, lifelong learning, and community well-being. Our libraries continue to be a cornerstone of knowledge, creativity, and leisure, providing resources and opportunities for personal and professional growth. We launched the Mobile Library to bring the joy of reading and essential library services to underserved areas and populations across Surrey. This innovative library on wheels offers over 1,000 items to borrow, including books for all ages, both fiction and nonfiction.

The Mobile Library visits many community locations such as recreation centres, food banks, and settlement agencies, ensuring everyone has access to library resources. In addition to books, the Mobile Library provides free library cards, basic technology help, and free Wi-Fi.

Our friendly and knowledgeable staff are always on hand to assist patrons, making the Mobile Library a welcoming and valuable resource for the community.

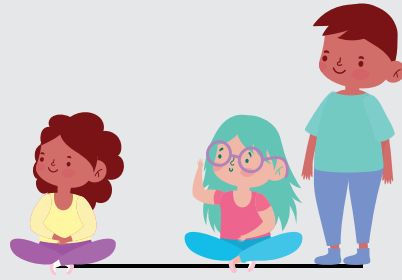

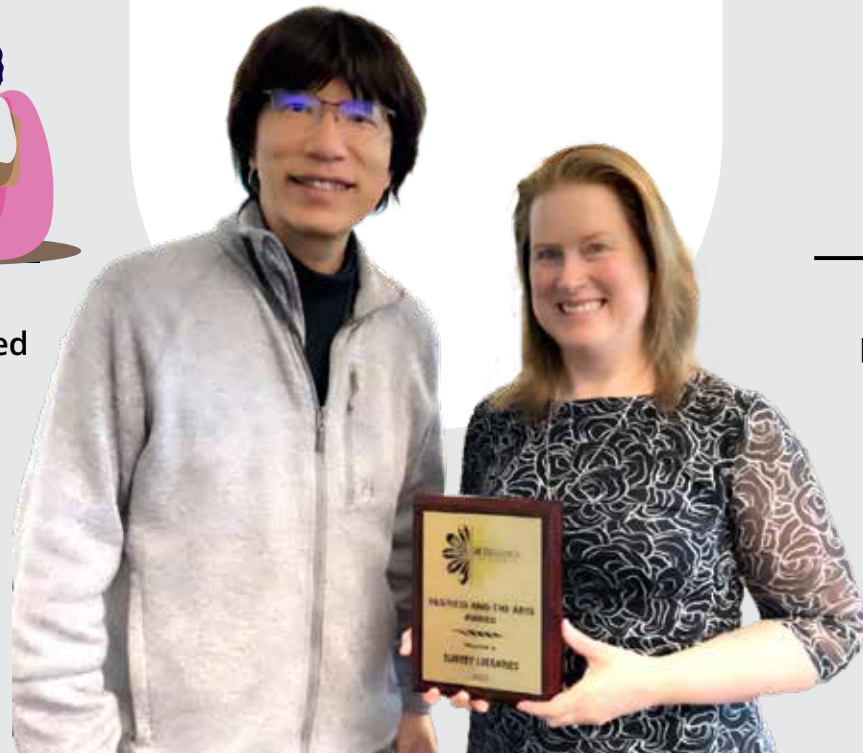

Our Commitment to Reconciliation

Surrey Libraries is committed to Reconciliation and is working to respond to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Calls to Action.

Through programming and other initiatives, we are working to build more meaningful connections between the Library, the Indigenous community, and the citizens of Surrey. Our aim is to grow understanding of the rich cultural fabric of the Indigenous history of these lands, to showcase Indigenous culture, and to also listen and learn from our Indigenous communities.

Indigenous Knowledge Keeper

Surrey Libraries welcomed Les George as the first Indigenous Knowledge Keeper to help foster a deeper understanding of Indigenous cultures.

Métis titles

We added Métis titles for book club kits in consultation with Waceya Métis Society.

Indigenous Book Distribution

We distributed 412 books by Indigenous authors at National Indigenous Peoples Day event and other outreach to help promote Indigenous cultural literacy.

Indigenous Cultural Awareness Training

We offered Indigenous cultural awareness training to all staff through InterLINK to build a common understanding of the diverse histories, cultures, and contributions of Indigenous peoples and to foster a more inclusive and respectful workplace environment.

Welcoming Learning Spaces

Our branches are vital community hubs, welcoming everyone from newborns to seniors.

Our spaces, both physical and online, are designed to be welcoming and inclusive for everyone. We work to ensure individuals and families feel welcomed and can easily access library services. We offer multilingual services and materials to accommodate the diverse language needs of our community. We work to provide our services to people with disabilities by providing accessibility services such as assistive technology and adaptive equipment. We host programs and events that celebrate diversity and promote cultural understanding.



Provided ongoing programming for seniors to support the City's Age-Friendly Strategy and growing aging population. Programs included Literature Club for Seniors, Seniors Book Club, and Audiobook Club.



Introduced programs such as English Conversation Circles, Studythons, and information sessions specifically aimed to support international students.



Added Envoy Connect Audiobook Players to our Accessibility Services collection.



Equipped each branch with a Sensory Kit to help neurodiverse patrons enjoy using the Library.



Offered American Sign Language (ASL) storytimes for deaf and hard-of-hearing children and their families.



Added several play-to-learn items at branches, such as KEVA Planks, DUPLO® Wall, and the Light Wall at City Centre.

We added new digital resources.

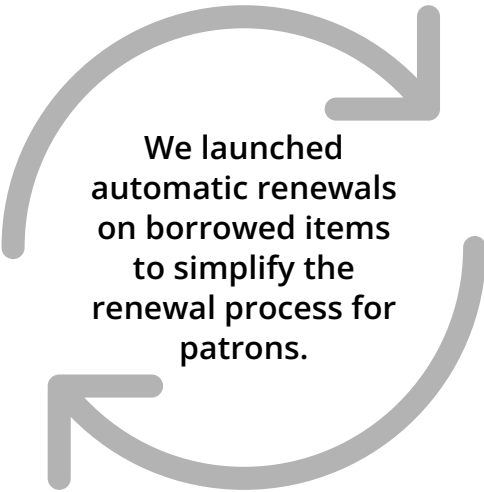


Gayle Harris Memorial Education Award Recipients

Annual value of library membership provided to the average cardholder was **\$1,032 in 2024**. For each dollar invested in Surrey Libraries, \$7.68 of value was generated for the community.

Library services cost just \$3.19 per month per citizen*

*2024 expenses: \$26,116,288 divided by Surrey's population based on City's planning department projection for 2024
682,235 = \$38.28 per citizen/year/12 = \$3.19
